For others, there are moments of radical transformation that jolt us into giving generously.


Sometimes we have to work to find our way into being generous.

Paul points out this character trait is exemplified by Christ who, "though rich, for your sake became poor" (2 Cor 8.9).

Generosity is the challenging attitude of being willing to give and do more than the minimum. Paul points out when we see our gifts and efforts changing lives the result is joy and a desire to become even more generous. Our membership commitment to uphold the church through our gifts is a thankful response for all God has given us.

We must be good stewards of everything that God has entrusted to us.
